

1901 and 1911 Civil Census

The Irish Government took a census in 1813 then every 10 years from 1821 to 1911. Due to the Irish Civil War of 1921-22 another census was not taken until 1926. The next was in 1936. Starting from 1946, a census was taken every 5 years to 1971. Since 1971, censuses have been taken every 10 years.

Only parts of the early censuses survive. The 1813 census was deliberately destroyed and then the censuses from 1821 to 1851 were mostly destroyed in 1922 in a fire at the Public Record Office in Dublin. The censuses from 1861 to 1891 were destroyed by the Government some time after statistics had been compiled from them. At the time their future importance to genealogy was not recognised.

The 1901 census is the first complete census available. This, and the 1911 census, are available for public search online on www.nationalarchives.ie.

With the exception of those noted, all the rest of the heads of the families were farmers or farm labourers. Not many owned the land they worked on and most of the dwellings were classified as 3rd or 4th class.

The number of Hayde families living in the rural areas had declined in the late 1800s. This reflected the effects of emigration and also the trend at the time of the shift to urban areas.
